

School performance in the North East

- The North East has the highest proportion of good and outstanding primary schools in England
- Secondary school inspection performance lags behind the national average and the gap is not closing quickly enough


Percentage of **primary** schools good or better






Percentage point change of **primary** schools good or better in last year





Percentage of **secondary** schools good or better






Change over the last year of the proportion of good or better secondary schools




Key Stage 2 and Key Stage 4 Performance

- North East pupils achieve at the national level in the proportion gaining Level 4+ in reading, writing and mathematics but there is significant in-region variation between LA areas
- North East pupils attain slightly below average results at the end of Key Stage 4 (5+CEM) and there is also significant in-region variation between LA areas.
- North East pupils at Key Stage 4 make less progress from Key Stage 2 than seen nationally – very weak in some LA areas
- Free school meal pupils do less well than their non-FSM peers at both Key Stage 2 and 4. At Key Stage 4 the gap is much greater than seen nationally. There is significant in-region variation (NE has highest % FSM outside inner London)

reading, writing and maths






Percentage of pupils achieving 5+ GCSEs

A*-C incl. English & mathematics






Excluding independent schools, 2013 KS4 level is 60.8%, however 59.2% is the widely used published figure.

Proportion of pupils securing L4+ in reading, writing and mathematics in 2013 by LA and eligibility for FSM






