Kenton is a very large complex urban school 1900 students, 360 staff
Oversubscribed on entry (Y7) in every year group, receiving students from relatively disadvantaged backgrounds, with attainment below national norms on entry.

- Students come predominantly from 8 designated feeder schools and 2 other partner intake schools, There are also many students from further afield, including almost every ward in the city of Newcastle.
- FSM are nearly double the National Average at 47.6% in 2014, which places the intake in the most disadvantaged quintile.
- Kenton's students are predominantly white British (6.5% ethnic minority in 2015).
- Kenton is in the top 20% of schools in terms of the numbers of students on roll with SEN.
- The mean tested reading age (NGRT) for Year 7 (2015) on entry was 10.89, a year below their mean chronological ages.
- 78 students had a reading age of 8.11 or below entering Kenton School (September 2015)
- RAISEonline shows that every year group in the school arrive with an APS from KS2 significantly below the National Average.
- September 2015 statistics 15.1% of students come in with a level 4C or below in both English and Maths
- 51% of students at the end of Key Stage 2 were at the expected level (DfE 2015 School and College Performance Tables).

Skills your child will learn this term

- Explain the importance of a text's setting or background
- · Identify the main points in a text.
- Make inferences and deductions from the play and poems
- Support comments with quotes and examples from the play and poems
- Analyse the play and the poems using a PEE paragraph structure (make a point, support this with evidence, explain your point further.)
- Comment on similarities and differences between The Tempest and the poems.
- Explore how the theme of love is developed across the play and the poems.
- Create certain drama roles based on the two different texts.


