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Focus on... implications of school funding reforms

It has long been a source of contention that schools of similar types in different parts of England receive vastly different levels of funding per pupil. The amount of funding an individual school receives is currently based on a complex formula involving a wide range of different criteria and involves significant discretion at a Local Authority level. With the aim of simplifying the system for allocating funding and making it fairer, more transparent and responsive to changes in pupil profiles, the Government has committed to introducing a national schools funding formula. On Friday, the Institute for Fiscal Studies launched a major report analysing the Government's plans to reform school funding in England and calculating the implications of the proposed system on different areas and types of schools.

The research sets out a range of different options for the design of a national formula and explores the outcomes of these options. The findings show that even under options designed to minimise the amount of disruption in the system, roughly one in six schools nationally would see cuts in funding of 10% or more compared with existing policy, while one in ten schools would see their funding increase by 10% or more.

Under the proposals the researchers found that the North East along with the West Midlands and Yorkshire and the Humber would be likely to receive less money, whilst regions such as the East Midlands and South East would receive more. Amongst individual areas within the North East there would also be winners and losers. At Primary level Darlington schools would gain an increase in funding of between 8-9.8% but Sunderland schools would face a reduction of between 6.3-7.3%. For the Secondaries, Northumberland schools can look forward to gains of 3.2-4% whilst Newcastle schools' allocation could be cut by 8.9-10.6%. The report's authors call on the Government to introduce the reforms gradually over a long period of time and to be very transparent about how the changes will impact on individual school to enable schools to effectively plan for the future.

"An explicit national formula offers significant advantages, including simplicity, transparency and responsiveness of school funding," Luke Sibeta, the senior research economist at the IFS said. "But change would also bring costs and disruption with large losses for some schools. If the Government believes that a national funding formula represents the ideal system, it should begin the transition soon and be more transparent about which schools and local authorities could be most affected," he added.

The DfE responded to the findings stating that no decisions had been made on funding reforms but that some schools would receive more and others less under the proposals and that they would introduce transitional arrangements to ensure schools do not experience sharp changes to their budgets.

In the TES's coverage of the report, David Grigg, Head Teacher of Lord Lawson of Beamish School in Gateshead was quoted as saying that he favours a national funding formula that also has local flexibility as "(It) should give schools as much independence as possible in deciding how their funding should be spent - they understand and can respond to their students' needs much more effectively than either local authorities or central government."

National education news

The Ofsted annual report 2011

The Ofsted Annual report 2011, launched today, reveals that 57% of schools inspected in 2010/11 were found to have been delivering a good or outstanding standard of education. Just 6 % of schools inspected this year were judged inadequate, a decrease from 8% last year.

The report shows that there remains a strong link between deprivation and the quality of schools. 71% of schools serving the least deprived pupils were judged to be good or outstanding compared to 48% serving the most deprived pupils.

Ofsted also warns that nearly 800 schools visited by school inspectors this year are "stuck" at Satisfactory and are failing to improve. 14% of schools visited by inspectors were judged as satisfactory twice in a row and their capacity to improve was found to be no better than satisfactory.

Teaching training applications fall

On Friday, the TES reported that applications for Teacher Training courses have fallen by nearly a third according to figures from the Graduate Teacher Training Registry. Commentators suggest that

the drop is a reaction to the removal of bursaries for applicants for “non-priority” subjects or those with less than a 2:1 in their undergraduate degree and more students choosing to follow school-based training routes. The number of people applying to start secondary teacher training courses in chemistry has fallen by 41.3%, while applications for German are down 42% and Spanish 47%. Applications to train as English teachers are down 39.1% and Maths 26.9%. Education Secretary Michael Gove confirmed last week that graduates with first class degrees in Physics, Chemistry, Maths and Modern Foreign Languages will receive bursaries of up to £20,000 in the future to help them train.

SEN children make big step forward in English and Maths, according to new report

An independent evaluation of a Government-funded pilot programme has found that children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) have made remarkable progress in attainment, behaviour and attendance as a result of their involvement in Achievement for All

The programme, which has been running in around 450 schools for the last two years, saw children make greater progress in English and maths than other SEND children across the country with a significant number exceeding the progress of non-SEND children.

The Government has now committed £14 million to help fund the roll-out of Achievement for All which is being delivered by a new charity, Achievement for All 3As, supported by PwC and is encouraging schools to come forward and sign up for the scheme.
