### Focus on...improving attendance in school

In 2010-11, the North East had the highest percentage of children regularly absent from school in the country, with more than 20,000 pupils missing at least a month of school, according to figures from the Department for Education. Middlesbrough and Newcastle both came in the bottom ten of local authorities ranked on their percentage of persistently absent pupils. Each had a rate of 8.8 per cent, compared to the national average of 6.1 per cent.

Yesterday the Government announced their plans to crackdown on school absences following the publication of a review by their Expert Advisor on Behaviour, Charlie Taylor. Taylor's independent review called 'Improving attendance at schools' makes a series of recommendations to tackle persistent absenteeism and to give greater emphasis on addressing truancy at primary level such as:

- Make data on attendance in reception classes available along with local and national averages – this fits with the government's policy of giving as much information as possible about school performance.
- Publish national statistics on attendance for the whole year, not just up until half term in the summer, as is currently the case. The exception to this would be for Year 11.
- Asks Ofsted to set specific, timed targets for improving attendance in schools where it is low.
- Encourage all primary schools to analyse their data on attendance so that they can quickly pick up on children who are developing a pattern of absence including in nursery and reception.

These recommendations have been accepted by the Government.

On the issue of term-time holidays, the review does not recommend the introduction of an outright ban, suggesting that Head Teacher discretion should remain but that the rules should be 'toughened up'. The Government has stated that it will amend the Pupil Registration Regulations to make clear that schools should only give permission where there are exceptional circumstances. However, it was the announcement that the Government plans to change to parental sanctions for school absence in response to the review that captured the media's interest.

Last year, 820 penalty notices were issued for unauthorised school absence by councils in the North-East and North Yorkshire. From September, Head Teachers will be able to impose an increased fine of £60 on parents whom they consider are allowing their child to miss too much school without a valid reason and if they fail to pay within 28 days it will double to £120, to be paid within 42 days.

The Government is also considering whether to implement the review's recommendation that once the fine has doubled, the money should be recovered automatically from child benefit. Parents who do not receive child benefit and fail to pay fines would have the money recovered through the county courts.

Secretary of State for Education Michael Gove said: "Successive governments have focussed overwhelmingly on tackling truancy amongst older children...Improving the attendance of younger children at primary school will reduce the number who develop truancy problems when they are older.... I agree that the current penalty notice scheme should be simplified. I will work with my colleagues in the Government to explore ways to make the payment of penalty notices swift and certain."

The need for a more streamlined system was supported by ASCL General Secretary, Brian Lightman, who said "Schools do not want to have to resort to fining parents, but sometimes it is the only option left. For these rare cases, the system needs streamlining so that fines are an effective deterrent rather than an idle threat. "

Christine Blower of the NUT, however, criticised the idea of deducting money from child benefit, arguing that this "will have huge financial repercussions for many families. Having less money for food and bills will simply create a whole new set of problems." Her view was echoed by a number of child poverty campaigners and family charities who highlighted the link between poverty and absenteeism and raised concerns over the pressure the moves could place on struggling families. Nationally, the statistics for the 2010-11 school year showed that children on free school meals, or those with special educational needs, were about three times more likely to be persistently absent.

## Top national education news

### In Parliament this week

Yesterday, Education Secretary Michael Gove and colleagues from the DfE took to the dispatch box for another session of Education Questions in the House of Commons. Again, North East MPs and issues were well represented.

Alex Cunningham, MP for Stockton North, quizzed John Hayes, the Minister for Further Education and Skills, on the removal of the requirement for schools to provide work experience. He argued that this was a ‘regressive step’ when nearly 12% of young people in the Stockton Borough are not in education, employment or training and called on the Government to reverse the policy. The Minister responded by praising Stockton North on a 76% increase in apprenticeships in the area.

Newcastle Central MP, Chi Onwurah, took the opportunity to ask the Secretary of State about the legal costs of free schools, academies and forced academisations in Newcastle upon Tyne and accused Gove of imposing ‘chaos on our education system’.

In response Gove said “The council tax payers of Newcastle have already paid in the past for the failure of that local authority to raise standards in schools to a level seen in other local authorities, including Gateshead for example. It is critical that we raise standards in Newcastle and we will do so by welcoming new educational providers, including those who propose free schools.”

Sharon Hodgson, MP for Washington and Sunderland West, raised concerns about the impact of cuts to childcare tax credits on nurseries, warning that child care providers risked being ‘driven out of business.’

And Wansbeck MP Ian Lavery expressed his worries about the 75% of UK schools that contain asbestos and asked the Government to explain the measures it has taken to avoid future asbestos-related deaths in our schools.

### **Universities to take charge in exam shake-up**

Over the Easter holiday it was announced that the Government would no longer play a part in the setting of A-level exams. For the first time in 30 years universities will be given powers to set A-levels because of fears that the gold standard qualification is failing to prepare teenagers for the demands of higher education.

The main exam boards will be expected to consult leading academics, with a particular emphasis on senior dons from Russell Group universities, before drawing up exam syllabuses and test questions. The new proposals are expected to be introduced in September 2014.

### **New rules to exclude disruptive children**

New rules published by the DfE will put an end to excluded pupils winning the right to come back to school against the Head Teacher's wishes. Under the new system, Head Teachers will have the power to exclude a child as long as the decision is legal, reasonable and fair. However, the Government's ultimate intention is to reduce the need for exclusion by supporting schools to manage behaviour and intervene earlier to address any underlying causes.

## School to School

In this feature, we ask a local Head give us a brief insight into their school. This week we spoke to Neil Richmond from Stobhillgate First School in Morpeth, Northumberland, which has about 180 pupils aged 3 to 9.

**Our school is** very diverse due to the catchment area, which makes it really exciting and our children learn social skills very early which is important for life.

**Our motto is** to enjoy school now and also prepare our children to be successful learners.

**Our school is good at being** very creative and always doing something different in order to give our pupils memorable experiences for life.

**We are working on** - guess what? The four new Ofsted areas! We think we do them all well but best to be prepared....

**The biggest challenges for our school are** current over-subscription in the Reception class for 2012. Oh yes, and finances of course - there's never enough money to even scrape by so every decision made ends up being financial. Shame. We are, however, lucky enough to be having our school made water-tight so that's a new roof. Hooray! Bet you couldn't get that under academy status!

**We think other schools would be interested in** our outdoor learning and what we've done with it from three consecutive years of fabulous Creative Partnership money. We're continuing to develop this anyway even without the money. You know the expression, 'Where there's a will...'

**What would you be interested in hearing from other schools about?** I love visiting any other schools. It's how we learn and take back any fantastic ideas which they all have. I was lucky enough to visit the opening of the Bishop Semantu High school newly opened in Hull. WOW! Make a bee-line if you can. It's how a school should be for this age group of children. The resources are stunning.

**Question from last week's school is: How can schools work more closely together without compromising their autonomy?** In Morpeth we have a lovely partnership which works very well together. It hasn't always been this way but virtually all seventeen of our schools learn from each other. We organised a teaching day for all our teachers (all 250+ of them!) which was inspirational and have scrutinised data across all tiers including Middle school to whom we feed and the High school. I wasn't looking forward to this but found it illuminating and have some excellent evidence for you know who!

Sorry if this doesn't answer the question but I couldn't work with a heavy-handed school suggesting this is how we should do it. Every school is totally unique and a part of its community. Just like every

child is an individual. I'm a Professional Partner and love to work with new Head Teachers. They are all doing a fantastic job in their schools. I learn more from them!

**Question for next week's school: do you agree that current applications from LLEs, NLEs and teaching schools, etc is representative enough or do you think those applicants or schools should be visited to see the REAL deal?** I personally have always interviewed applicants for jobs in our school and elsewhere. I like to see the actual person or school. Online applications to me are only part of it.
